Peover Eye

The *Peover* is formed of the junction of two streams, one of which rises near Macclesfield, the other near Gawsworth; they join at Chelford, whence the Peover passes to Over-Peover, Nether-Peover, Holford, and Wincham-bridge, falling into the Weever, near Northwich; the course of this river is about fifteen miles.⁸

Stephen le Bird saw a foal of his in the water of Peover, and went into the river to drive the animal out, but accidentally he himself was drowned. He was found by his brother, John. The accident was reported by the coroner of Bucklow and the four townships of Wincham, Lostock, Marston and Witton. This suggests that the incident took place in Wincham: the river now called Peover Eye meets Smoker Brook not far from Holford Hall, and is then called Wincham Brook down to the Weaver. The river here formed the boundary between Bucklow and Northwich hundreds.
