Chorlton

Robert de Chorley

Thomas son of Roger de Chorlton claimed that on Sunday 28 June 1282. Robert de Chorley, bailiff of sir William de Audley, seized two oxen and a horse of his. Robert replied that Thomas held 4 bovates of land in Chorlton by the service of finding four footmen and a beadle in time of war, and feeding his beadle. In some way undescribed Thomas had failed in this service and so he had been distrained. Thomas said that, in fact, he held just 3 bovates, and the service due was finding **three** footmen and a beadle. The jury agreed.
